I maintain friendships, hobbies, and sources of fulfillment that don't depend on my spouse's participation or approval.

I'm not sacrificing my core values or identity

Staying doesn't require me to become someone I'm not or abandon what matters most to me.

I trust myself to leave if things become unhealthy

I'm not frozen by fear. If the situation truly deteriorated, I believe I would have the courage to choose differently.

If you scored mostly 7-10: You're likely practicing empowered staying. If you scored mostly 1-4: It may be time to explore why fear, rather than choice, is keeping you in place.

- Am I choosing this marriage, or am I simply afraid of the alternative?
- What would I need to make empowered staying possible?
- What would I need to make empowered leaving possible?
